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## CHAPTER - 1

## CHAPTER - 2

### INTRODUCTION

Under article 371 of the Constitution of India and Development Boards Order, 2011 *vide* its para 6(f), the annual report of Vidarbha Development Board has been prepared. This report is submitted to the Hon'ble Governor for tabling in Maharashtra State Legislative Assembly.

#### 2.1 Establishment of Statutory Development Board :

Under article 371(2) of the Constitution of India, the Hon'ble President of India directed to establish the three Statutory Development Boards of Vidarbha, Marathwada & Rest of Maharashtra *vide* Orders, dated 9th March, 1994. The Hon'ble Governor in accordance with the powers entrusted to him, established the three Statutory Development Boards on 30-4-1994. Subsequently the Chairman and Boards' Members were appointed on 25th June, 1994.

As per the above mentioned order, the term of the Development Board was to expire on 30-4-2015. However, by taking into account the important contribution of the Board and since the regional imbalance could not be removed, the Hon'ble President of India extended the term of the Board upto 30th April, 2020.

The structure of the Board as on 31-3-2015, is as follows:

- Chairman
- Executive Chairman, State Planning Commission- *Ex-officio* Member.
- One member of the Legislative Assembly, from each revenue division, for every two and half years, turn by turn.
- One representative each from rural and urban local authority under the jurisdiction of the Board, for every two and half years, turn by turn.
- Five expert members.
- Divisional Commissioners of Amravati and Nagpur divisions.
- Member Secretary.

(The posts of member of the Legislative Assembly and representative of local authority are vacant)

## **2.2 Functions of the Development Board :**

As per the Governor's order, the functions of the Development Board are as follows -

The Development Board from time to time shall:

1. Ascertain capability of social and economic development in relation to its area, on the basis of available resources in its jurisdiction, its needs and opportunities, after considering the overall development of the entire State.
2. Identify areas, sectors, population groups which require special attention within the area of the Board.
3. Prepare Regional/ District development reports which shall be updated periodically. The Regional/ District Development reports shall include the following items :
  - an analysis of assessment of local human and natural resources and analysis of capability of social economic development;
  - the development status of important population groups as per the development indicators of the concerned social-economic areas;
  - computation of development status of human development indicators like health, education and livelihood problems;
  - an outline of regional development plan based on resources and potential of the regions;
  - Impact on assessment and evaluation of programmes under the plan and regional development as a whole;
4. Suggest the levels of development expenditure for the operative areas of the Development Boards, during the annual and five year plan periods;
5. Assess the impact of various development efforts in removing regional imbalance and in achieving overall development within its area;
6. Prepare an annual report of the working of the Board, and send it as far as practicable, within three months after the end of every financial year and submit the same to the Hon'ble Governor for placing before the Maharashtra State Legislature.

## CHAPTER -3

### 3.1 Meetings of the Board, Discussions/ Resolutions on Important Subjects

Total nine meetings of the Board were held during the period from 1st April, 2014 to 31st March, 2015. In the meetings various issues such as review of the works, development policies, backlog of development in Vidarbha, and necessary measures required to be taken from planning point of view were discussed in detail.

**Particulars of the Important Subjects, Discussed/ Resolutions taken; and actions taken thereon, etc; in the Board's meetings, are as follows :**

### **3.1.1 Study of Vidarbha Culture - Discussions on draft report and its finalization.**

**Date 01.07.2014**

Hon'ble member Dr. Mrinalini Fadanvis has explained salient points of the report in the meeting. It is informed in the meeting that the government had sanctioned 167 drama theatres in 1982. Out of that one theatre is in Chandrapur and other is in Gadchiroli district; those theatres when visited have been found in the most pathetic condition, and it is necessary to take up their urgent improvement and the government must pay attention towards it. The people in zadi-patti are culturally very much enthusiastic; their drama tradition and language are originally enriched. Govt. aid is necessary to give professional look to this cultural movement.

If this is realized, we can expect to develop a good stage and it should help to elevate standard of living of artists of zadi-patti area; as stated by Mrinalini Fadanvis. The government pension scheme is although approved for old artists, but it is noticed that the scheme is not implemented properly enough; as such enthusiasm of artist is at low ebb. Zadi-patti theatre is not limited to artists from Nagpur area, but artist from other parts of the state are also engaged in it, on a large scale. Therefore, there are many employment opportunities emerged in the field of acting and in other concerned branches, Therefore it is opined in the report that Nagpur deserved to have a branch of National School of drama in order to achieve growth and development of this movement.

Although the board extended its interim approval to this report; it is decided that the member should give their final suggestions on the report in a fortnight; so that those suggestions could be considered before report finalization.

### **3.1.2 Discussion on the draft report on the present status of Madia tribe in Gadchiroli district regarding nutrition and finalization of the report.**

Based on the information obtained during visits to the many villages in the district and to the institutions engaged in tribal's health field, and the report on the present status of Madia tribe in Gadchiroli district regarding nutrition has been prepared based on the collected information. Long back in the year 2005, the study was taken on this subject by other institutions. However, it was observed that there has not been much change in last 10 years in the status on tribals' health. Although supplementary nutritional diet is distributed through government supplementary nutritional diet scheme, intensity of their health problems did not reduce. The problem of health of tribal is linked with their lifestyle. Moreover, absence of basic amenities is also an important factor. Shrimati Purnima Upadhaya, expert member, told that women carried water from a distance of 3-4 km. There is no water in villages. There is scarcity of water around "Gharkul" prepared under "Gharkul" scheme. Therefore, not much attention is paid towards cleanliness. Likewise, their regular diet sans vitamins; thereby causing adverse effect on health.

The chairman told that problem of virgin mothers is a serious one. Shrimati Fadnavis told that only "Gotul System" is available, in the area, for education. As such health problems of girls are serious. There is serious emergence of 'Malaria' in all talukas of 'Gadchiroli district'. It is told in the meeting that there is need to take note of this in the 'District Development' report. It is also told in the meeting that 'Asha worker' is a good arrangement; and women of the district are ready to work at this place. So, this could be used as a tool to resolve health problem. Shri Khadse, member, explained that it is required to raise awareness in woman so as to, improve their standard of life. He thought that effect of development in Mendha could be studied to know its effect of on surrounding villages. Since the report required more discussions, exchange of thoughts, the chairman sought suggestions from members.



### **3.1.3 Study of Vidarbha Culture - Discussions on draft report and its finalization.**

**Date 04.08.2014**

This report is finalized. Computerized copy of the report is to be given by Hon'ble member to the office; and then office should prepare necessary copies for submitting the same to the Hon'ble Governor, said the chairman.

### **3.1.4 Discussion on the draft report on the present status of Madia tribe in Gadchiroli district regarding nutrition and finalization of the report.**

**Date 04-08-2014**

This report is also finalized. Computerized copy of the report is to be given by Hon'ble member to the office; and then office should prepare necessary copies for submitting the same to the Hon'ble Governor, said the chairman.

### **3.1.5 Letter written by Adv. Madhukar Kimmatkar, expert member, to the Under Secretary, under the 'Right to information act, 2005, regarding lesser proportion of young men and young ladies from Vidarbha, in government service.**

**Date 04-08-2014**

Compressive information is not forthcoming from government on this issue. Therefore hearing on appeal application is decided for 5th Aug. 2014 with G.A.D. under right to information. During this hearing it is expected to receive boardwise information on all departments which are working under government, regarding No. of sanctioned posts, filled posts and vacant posts. But information is not given in respect of departments which are under the control of government. Population of Vidarbha is about 23% out of state's population; but in service share of Vidarbha is very less, pointed Adv. Kimmatkar, expert member. There has been extensive discussions on this; and as per para 371(2), it is expected that G.A.D. should collect this information from various departments. But the government is not taking proper cognisance; the chairman expressed his displeasure on this and suggested board to follow up this issue with the office of the Hon'ble Governor.

### **3.1.6 Maintenance and repairs of irrigation projects in Vidarbha and their distribution system.**

**Date 04-08-2014**

Adv. Kimmatkar, expert Member gave information on the subject in the meeting. After viewing the water cess/ tax collected from farmers of Nagpur and Amravati Division, their demand for maintenance and repairs and the actual grants made available, it is seen that Rs. 328 crore were demanded for maintenance and repairs. In fact Rs. 239 crore were recovered from farmers, but only Rs. 121 crore were given for maintenance and repairs. The balance money was diverted to western Maharashtra. From this, it is concluded that since fund is not received as expected, expenditure on maintenance and repairs could not be made in proper manner. In absence of this, canals are breached causing damage to farmers land. In order to remove such injustice, chairman advised Adv. Kimmatkar for giving separate proposals to the office of Hon'ble Governor and irrigation department.

### **3.1.7 Information on No. of divisionwise energized agricultural pumps, backlog and additional pumps.**

**Dt. 04-08-2014**

Adv. Kimmatkar, expert Member' gave information on the subject in the meeting. In Vidarbha No. of farmers doing farming is 28%. Backlog of agricultural pumps in Vidarbha is 426893. But the No. of agricultural pump is more than the State's average in Nashik, Pune divisions; and some districts in Marathwada division. It is seen from the above that backlog of energisation of agricultural pumps in every district of Vidarbha is too large. Vidarbha is also far behind in using energy for agricultural pumps.

The electricity consumption for agricultural pumps per hectare in Konkan division is 129 units, in Nashik division 1787 units, in Pune division 1824 units, in Marathwada division 1089 units, in Amravati division 700 units, in Nagpur division 419 units.

The subsidy is given by the State Government for electric consumption of agricultural pumps. Its share in Pune division is 32%, in Nashik division 29%. As compared to that share of Amravati division is 9% and Nagpur division received only 4% of subsidy. From this it is seen that in Vidarbha where maximum electricity is generated, backlog is very high.

Farmers in Vidarbha put their demand for connecting 55,443 agricultural pumps for electric connection, in 2013-14. But they are given connection only for 25859. Thus, number of pending A-1 applications is 65648. Similarly the backlog for connecting agricultural pumps in Nagpur, Buldhana and Amravati district is very large in proportion.

### **3.1.8 Policy changes in fishery profession and Tribal community**

**Date 15-8-2014**

Shrimati Purnima Upadhyay, ' Expert Member ' presented report on effect of tribal's livelihood engaged in fishery profession in the meeting of the Board for approval. Extensive discussions have been made on the subject. Fishery is a profession where returns are more and faster. Therefore, all rights in this respect should be transferred to the Gramsabha. The study report is approved by all and it has been finalized.

### **3.1.9 Finalisation of report of tourism and archaeological studies in Vidarbha and recommendations.**

**Date 15-08-2014**

Dr. Shrimati Mrinalini Fadanvis, expert member, has presented detailed information of the said study report. While preparing this study report she has visited almost all the tourist spots of Vidarbha, with the help from officers of the Archaeological department. She informed that there is lot of scope for tourism in Vidarbha. But most of those historical places are in vary pathetic conditions. If amenities are made available with the land for foreign tourist, under tourism programme the tourism could grow in large proportion. Presently, the most difficult problem in development of tourism is absence of residential facilities. Tiger tourism, tourism for adventure sports, agricultural tourism, water sports/tourism, social tourism, historical places tourism, those are the various types where there is immense scope. For tourism under adventure sports, visit is given to the places like Khindsi and Itiadh. Under international tourism places Sewagram and Pawnar have been visited. Hon'ble Chairman has made available funds through district planning committee and forest tourism facility is developed in 250 acres land in Karanja (lad) ; and suggested that all members should visit this place. Almost all the places important from tourism point of view have been visited along with officers of Archaeological department. In general about 11 persons out of 100 are involved in tourism; that is in the world 11% persons are tourists. However, contribution of Vidarbha in tourism is only 1%. considering this statistics, it is evident that there is lot of scope for tourism in Vidarbha. Discussions were also made regarding other important tourist places in Vidarbha. Hon'ble chairman suggested that those places should also be included in the report and the report should be completed, after making detailed studies, in one week.

### **3.1.10 Constituting sub-committee for the studies to be taken up in 2014-15 and deciding its procedure.**

**Date 15-8-2014.**

Detailed discussions were done on use and utility of the medicinal plants. Hon'ble Shri Devaji Tofa, Expert Member, is Head of this sub-committee. But since he is already preoccupied with a number of study reports, the Hon'ble Chairman suggested that Shrimati Purnima Upadhyay, Expert Member, may be made 'Head' of this

sub-committee, retaining the other members. Accordingly, the sub-committees for various studies have been constituted as follows :

### **3.1.11 G.R. in respect of special fund for Development Board**

**Date : 15-8-2014**

Planning department of Govt. of Maharashtra is making available special fund of Rs. 100 crore to Vidarbha Development Board. This G. R. has been read. Hon'ble Chairman indicated that if all hon'ble members wanted to suggest some measures or to give suggestions, they should give the same along with their comments.

The works to be taken, as recommended by the Board, under this fund, *vide* No. 6 of Sl. No. 2(B) of the above stated G.R., are to be monitored and evaluated. For this purpose, some facilities like computer and other necessary items which are not available presently in the office, could be purchased from this fund, for the purpose of monitoring and evaluations. Detailed discussions were made in the meeting over the various above stated issues. Hon'ble Chairman directed that further necessary action should be immediately taken up.

### **3.1.12 Taking approval of the Board for study report on 'Dalit Vasti Sudhar Yojana' taken up under the study of Scheduled Castes components.**

**Date : 19-09-2014**

Shri M. N. Khadse, Expert Member has given the detailed information in the meeting on study report. While preparing study report Shri Khadse selected 2 districts, one each in 2 divisions; which were allotted maximum amount of fund. Those districts have been Nagpur district under Nagpur Division and Amravati district under Amravati division. Two talukas from each district and 5 villages in each taluka were selected randomly. In this way, 44 dalit habitations (vasti) in 40 villages were selected for taking up their inspections. Many observations have been noted about this work, in the report. The members endorsed those observations during discussions. Some policy issues, like the work taken up under this scheme should be co-ordinated by the Gram panchayat only. Some

members expressed need to include this point in the study report prominently. Shri M. N. Khadse agreed to incorporate this amendments in the report. After that the report has been approved by the Board.

### **3.1.13 Presentation on the view taken by Yashada, Pune in the context of preparation of district development report**

**Date : 19-9-2014**

Dr. Minal Naravane, Director, Human Development Centre of Yashada and Addl. Director of Yashada, Shri Lokhande have made presentation on the view taken by Yashada, Pune, in the context of preparation of district development report, before the Board; All the board members participated in discussions on this presentation and made suggestions from time to time. Hon'ble Member Secretary requested members to give their suggestions in writing, so that proper action could be taken on those suggestions. During the discussions, Dr. Vinayak Dehspande, Pro-Vice Chancellor, Rashtra Sant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Dr. Sneha Deshpande, Head, Economics department of the University, Shri Nilesh Gatane, Additional Collector, Gadchiroli district, Shri Kalshetti, CEO, Yavatmal, Z.P. and Shri Sidam, District Planning Officer, and Shri Atale, Prof. Kapil and Shri Barhate were also present. Yashada with co-operation of Nagpur University should decide the procedure of work, for preparation of the report; and may take further action to take up the actual work. Yashada may keep co-ordination with Hon'ble members from time to time. The Board should be apprised every month of the progress of the work made by Yashada.

### **3.1.14 Taking approval of the Board for study report on 'Dalit Vasti Sudhar Yojana' taken up under the study of scheduled castes components.**

The approval is given to the study report of Dalit Vasti Sudhar Yojana.

### **3.1.15 Deciding procedure of study reports to be taken up in 2014-15.**

**Date : 19-11-2014**

Detailed discussions were done on this subject. Hon'ble Chairman suggested to take up further action in order to complete study reports to be taken up during 2014-2015.

1. Study of implementation of water shed management programme - Shri Madhukarrao Khadse
2. Study of integrated results of the various development programmes implemented in Naxal affected areas - Shri Devaji Tofa.
3. Regarding problems of orange producers of Vidarbha - Shri S. J. Dharmale, Jt. Director

### **3.1.16 Proposals under special fund :**

**Date : 04-12-2014**

The Hon'ble Chairman suggested that there should be clarity in the context of the proposals to be recommended for special fund 2014-15, and the proposed works should be completed by the end of the financial year 2014-15. With this point of view, discussions should be help up with officers of Public Health; Water Supply,

G.S.D.A., Education department and tourism and proposals should be put up in the meeting to be held in the next week. Similarly, proposals for appropriate works should be put up in the next meeting, without delay for discussions and necessary action.

### **3.1.17 Report on status of transfer of tribal land cases**

**Date 6-2-2015**

Shrimati Purnima Upadhyay informed that there is no need to take up the study on the subject of minor forest produce and Forest Rights Act, since the Hon'ble Governor has given directions. It was proposed that fund allotted for this study should be used now for the above stated study which is considered necessary. The Board has approved this proposal, and also approval is given for constitution of the following sub-committee.

1. Shri Prakash Dahake, Chairman, Nagpur - Sub-committee Chairman
2. Smt. Purnima Upadhyay, Member VDB Nagpur, Sub-committee member
3. Shri Devaji Tofa, Member VDB Nagpur, Sub-committee member

### **3.2 Important Issues in the Context of Development of Vidarbha**

The fact as brought out by Board's expert member Hon'ble Adv. Madhukarrao Kimmatkar in his study on the subject, under reference, is as follows:

The Hon'ble President of India has promulgated orders on 9th March 1994 and vested special responsibility with the Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra under 371 (2) of the Constitution of India. In accordance with this provision, it is expected to carry out his responsibility of balanced development of all divisions of the State. But it is noticed by the Board that in many respects the backwardness of Vidarbha is on a larger scale when compared with other divisions of the State; and it is still increasing. Some of its examples are as follows :

#### **3.2.1 Status of Irrigation in Vidarbha**

1. Dr. Dandekar Committee has decided irrigation backlog based on its status in 1992. The backlog is calculated by computing irrigation capacity (Rabi equivalent) as compared to area under crop in the state, and state average was decided on this basis. Those districts where irrigation capacity is lower than the state average have been considered of having backlog. The extra irrigation required to be done for the area under crop in the district; is as irrigation backlog of that district. Based on the irrigation capacity generated by June 1982, Dr. Dandekar Committee calculated state average of 22.55%. Those districts which have less irrigation capacity over the states average, their total backlog was of 924290 hect. Out of that, Vidarbha's backlog was of 527,310 hect.; Marathwada had 260,670 hect., Kokan division had 105,580 hect., Nashik district had 770 hect. and Dhule district had backlog of 29,960 hect.

2. After that indicator and backlog committee decided the backlog based on status in June, 1994. The committee used the same methodology as that has been used by Dr. Dandekar. The state's average was 35.11 and on that basis district wise and division wise irrigation backlog was decided. The total backlog of the state was 1383200 hect. Out of that Vidarbha's backlog was 787,700 hect. It is significant here to note that there was no backlog in any district of Pune division in 1982 or in 1994 or thereafter.

3. Maharashtra Water Resources Regulatory Authority, 2005, Act was passed in both houses of the assembly and it is still under implementation. As per section 20 of this act every year district wise new backlog is to be decided and kept on the tables of the assembly. This authority placed 2012-13 report in the assembly on 22-12-2014. In the Appendix 5(3) the district wise new backlog created as in June 2012 is given. The generated irrigation capacity, as in June 2012 is 60.27%. Those districts whose backlog is lesser than the state's average their backlog is shown in Annexure-5(3). According to this backlog of Konkan is 78,250 hect., Nashik Division 1,39,510 hect., Pune Division - nil, Marathwada has backlog of 562,280 hect. and Vidarbha's 11,84,800 hect., and out of this, Amravati Division has backlog of 99,7420 hect.

From the above it is evident that backlog of Vidarbha is ever increasing.

4. In Maharashtra, backlog of 214,269 hectares of 1994 is still pending in June 2015 in Amravati Division in Buldhana, Akola, Washim and Amravati districts.

5. Plenty of water is available in Godavari and Tapi basins for irrigation in Vidarbha from that about 75% area can be brought under crop. But so far only about 30% irrigation capacity is created. About 30% work for water use is in progress but out of projects under construction the work in many projects is stopped due to various reasons beside planning for drinking water is yet to be taken.

6. Maharashtra Govt. has accepted report of Indicators and backlog committee in 2000. While approving this report a decision is taken that while removing backlog of 1994 no new backlog is to be created. However in irrigation field the backlog is constantly increasing.

7. Availability of water for irrigation in Amravati division is somewhat lesser. The Hon'ble Governor has suggested Maharashtra Govt. *vide* para 31 of directives dated 27-5-2009 to make proposal to seek additional water demand from Tapi basin. But progress of about this proposal is not much. Therefore about 33 TMC water which could be made available to Amravati division from Tapi basin has not materialized. Similarly enough extra water is available in east Vidarbha from Godavari basin. A proposal is under government's consideration to take this extra water to Amravati Division by river linking project. The detailed proposal in this respect is sent to the government by Chief Engineer of Nagpur Division. According to this water for irrigation could be made available to Amravati division through Vaingana-Nalgana Project. There is need to speed up this work by the government.

8. There is need to speed up project work in Vidarbha and particularly in Amravati division. There are some problem in doing it such as (1) to give revised administrative approval (2) speed up work of land acquirement and rehabilitation (3) Filling up of about 30% vacant posts in Vidarbha Irrigation Board (4) Problems regarding obtaining clearance for forest land to be resolved. Urgent action from the government is required to resolve those problems.

9. Fund is collected through water cess for use of water (both irrigation and non irrigation) in respect of working projects in Vidarbha. This fund is deposited with the government. It is expected to get sufficient fund from this for O. and M. of canals, gates etc. But a very small portion of collected fund is made available for this purpose. This resulted in lot of water waste causing loss to the farmers. There is need to get sufficient fund on this count to Vidarbha.

### **3.2.2 Agricultural Pumps :**

It is also possible to make available the irrigation facility by agricultural pumps. As per the formula used by Dr. Dandekar Committee and Indicators and Backlog Committee, to decide backlog of agricultural pumps, it is computed as to how many pumps have been installed on an average as compared to total area under crop in the State and based on that the backlog of agricultural pumps is arrived or how many excess pumps have been installed in some districts. Efforts have been made by the Board to find out with help of this formula the status of agricultural

pumps energised at the end of March 2015. As per the information received from Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Co. Ltd., The state average of the pumps energised in total crop area is 233.80 per thousand hectare. Base on this the status of agricultural pumps as regards to their backlog or excess numbers, is as follows:

It is evident from this table that in many districts of the State excess pumps over the State's average have been installed. Contrary to this there is backlog of agricultural pumps in every district of Vidarbha except Bhandara district (0.01%). Expenditure of Rs. 10,634 crore is required to remove this backlog in the State. Out of that extra expenditure required for Vidarbha would be about Rs. 6635 Crores.

The backlog decided by the Indicators and Backlog Committee for agricultural pumps with a base as 1996. As per that the state average is 112.08 agricultural pumps per thousand hectare. Chandrapur and Gadchiroli districts could not reach to attain this average at the end of 31.03.2015. Out of 1996 backlog balance of Vidarbha by the end of March 2015 is 15,916 agricultural pumps and its information is as mentioned below:

On the contrary the district where agriculture pumps more than State's average have been installed their target for 2015-16 is more.

Besides this new applications will be there for installation of pumps in the year 2015-16. The targets given for Vidarbha are far less as compared to districtwise targets given for installing new agricultural pumps for the State in 2015-16.

In fact there is clear recommendation in the report of Dr. Dandekar Committee and Indicators and Backlog Committee that installation and energisation of pumps in the district where there is no backlog should taken only after installation and energisation of pumps in the district with backlog are completed. But at present action taken is just contrary to this and therefore backlog of agricultural pumps of Vidarbha is rising on a large scale.



Considering the electricity consumed in the State the electricity consumption for agricultural pumps per hectare, in 2014-15 is as follows :

Vidarbha where electricity is produced on a large scale has the lowest power consumption for agricultural pumps. Farmers have to bear with load shedding.

The subsidy is given by the State Government for electric consumption of agricultural pumps. In 2015-16 the State Government has given subsidy of Rs. 5317.75 Crore Rs. to the Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Co. Ltd. Its Divisionwise break-up is as given below :

Thus the proportion of subsidy given for agricultural pumps is meager.

### 3.2.3 Status of Development of Roads in Vidarbha :

1. As per the guidelines of the Indian Road Research Institute and Indian Road Congress under the Central Government the each State has to prepare districtwise road development plans every after 20 years. The lengths of all types of districtwise roads are to be given by the State Government except the National High Way which are under the control of the Central Government. In that plan (1) Main State Roads, (2) State Roads, (3) Main District Roads, (4) Other District Roads and (5) Village Roads are included expenditure for which is done from State Govt. fund.

Their maintenance and repairs, that is National High Way, Main State High Ways, State Roads, Main District Roads etc is met through both Central and State Govt. fund.

2. As per the information received from Public Works Department the status of development of roads in the State and Vidarbha is as follows :-

Presently for 2001-2021 road development plan work is going on in country and state.

The target of length of roads should be as per the area of the district, for the 20 years plan, as per the guidelines of the Central Road Congress.

A booklet of basic statistics of 2014 of the Public Works Department was received by the Board in July 2014.

The summary of information as regards to targets and achievements in respect of roads in Maharashtra is given as follows :

It is evident from the above information that target of 20 years road plan for Vidarbha is lesser as compared to other division. Target for Rest of Maharashtra and Marathwada is for 242704 km. against their geographic area of 209760 sq. km. It means length of road in per sq.km. area is 1.157 km. Against this target for Vidarbha is 94241.42 km for its geographic area of 97404 sq. kms. It gives length of road in per sq.km area is 0.968 km. Even to reach upto 1.157 km. average for Rest of Maharashtra and Marathwada extra target for Vidarbha has to be kept at 18455 km.

In terms of achievements Rest of Maharashtra achieved 78% on 31-3-2014 Marathwada 91% and Vidarbha achieved 70%. In this backlog for main district roads and rural roads is maximum for Vidarbha. This backlog in terms road km. is 13654 which required expenditure of about 6760 crore Rs.

### **3.3 The summary of Important Study Reports Being Taken by Vidarbha Development Board :**

#### **3.3.1 Fishery Profession and Tribal Community Policy Change :**

##### **Sub Committee Member :**

- (1) Shirmati Purnima Upadhyaya, Member, Vidarbha Development Board.
- (2) Shri Dilip Gode, Secretary, Vidarbha Nisarg Sanshodhan Sanstha, Nagpur.
- (3) Shri Manohar Bhrushundi, Retired Deputy Director, Fisheries Department.

##### **Scope of Work of Committee :**

- (1) Present status of Fisheries Profession in Schedule and other Tribal Area.
- (2) Present Status of Fisheries Co-operative Society's Management in Schedule and other Tribal Area; Benefits received by them and their problems.

(3) Management, control and utility of smaller lakes and observations regarding their use for :  
(A) Fisheries (B) Irrigation and (C) other uses.

(4) Supply of fish eggs.

(5) Rights of Scheduled Area People regarding Lakes, Fishery, their livelihood and Nutritional Diet.

(6) Appropriate Policy for Scheduled Area or change in Present Policy.

### **Recommendations :**

(1) Rights of lakes under scheduled areas and areas under Forest Act Rights should be immediately transferred to 'gramsabha' of that area. If those lakes are auctioned or contracts are given; those should be cancelled. Strict orders / instructions should be given to Z.P. or Deputy Commissioner, Fisheries Department for not contracting or auctioning of those lakes.

(2) If Gram Sabha gave any such contract the same should be cancelled before expiry of contract period.

(3) Since right to do fishery profession fish production/use/ management etc in scheduled areas and areas under Forest Act Rights are now vested with Gram Sabha, the Govt. departments which were earlier engaged in giving contract work they should not do it now. Similarly if Gram Sabha has passed resolution for cancelling lake contract they should not intervene into it.

(4) The survey should be taken of the lakes keeping in view of fishery profession falling under scheduled areas and Forest Rights Act 2006. This responsibility should be taken by Fishery Department or may be arranged through other organization. Detailed information of the survey should be provided to Gram Sabha.

(5) Gram Sabha should do fish breeding/fishing profession itself. They cannot give the lake on contract.

(6) The concerned department which are giving contract should transfer immediately, lakes upto 100 hectare falling under scheduled areas or lakes falling under Forest Rights Act to the Gram Sabha

(7) As per guidelines of the fishery department it is binding to store fish eggs/ young fishes in lakes, every year.

(8) Fish eggs would be provided/arranged by the Fishery department for the first five years. They have to send report of fishing in lake to the fishery department in a prescribed proforma.

(9) The responsibility to import fish eggs should accepted by the Fisheries Department.

(10) In the team made for surveying for the purpose of desilting and deepening of the lake officer(s) of Fisheries Department should be included.

(11) The deepening of lake work should be done through either 'MGNREGA' or Tribal Development Department or District Planning Committee or any other Government scheme.

(12) The first 15 to 23 cm. layer of silt is fertile hence it should be kept aside and it should be later on spread in the portion where deepening has been done.

(13) Most of the grant/concession schemes of the Fisheries Department are for Fisheries Co-operative Societies and their members. The Gram Sabha which fall under scheduled areas and Forest Rights Act 2006 and doing fishery profession itself and tribals who are not members of Fisheries Co-operative Societies should be given grants/concessions by relaxing conditions.

(14) For fishery equipments, transport and protection, concessions like members of Fishery Co-op. Society training should be given to those who have been recommended and certified by the Gram Sabha.

(15) Grant for cost of boat should be extended up to Rs. 7000/-

(16) Since fish is perishable item for its protection and fast transport tribal fisherman and Gram Sabha who is doing fishing profession itself should be provided 4 wheeler/bikes/cycles at the 'grant' rates. The freezer box should be given free of charge.

(17) Excluding scheduled areas and areas under community Forest Rights Act 2006 the new Fishery Co-op. Societies in other area, if those are registered and those which did not receive benefits so far, they should be provided with increased share capital and management grant.

(18) It should be binding to Fishery Co-op. Societies and Gram Sabha that the income received from fish sales should be apportioned properly and should be disbursed accordingly.

(19) The Fishery Department should arrange skill based training for local tribal fisherman and fishing profession management training.

(20) Special advertisement and canvassing should be done for culturing fishlets into young fishes in a temporary tank. For this purpose training should be given to locals with demonstration and also relevant information.

(21) The fishermen of tribal area should have scientific training in this field for development and storage of fish lets for transport and protection of fishes and they should develop interest in this profession. For this purpose Fishery Department should arrange for mobile training centre at district level.

(22) Fish keeping in a cage is a new project for proper tanks. Fishery Department should take a lead and start such programme in tribal area.

(23) The Fishery Department should take up study of local fishes and considering their scarcity, breeding programme may be taken up on priority. Some of the breeding centres with them should be reserved for this work.

(24) If the Gram Sabha is having more than one perennial tanks one tank should be preserved by them for culturing of local fish and its natural breeding.

(25) Removing vegetation and other obstacles within the tank is the responsibility of the Irrigation Department. It is binding for them to clean the tank before it is filled up and take certificate from Fisheries Department. But it is not done therefore both the department should take up the work with sympathy so that fishermen are not put to loss.

(26) The type of fish which is injurious to both ecology and environment should be banned for storing, and this should be implemented.

### **3.4 Special Fund :**

Grant of special fund given every year for removal of backlog of development works within the jurisdiction of Vidarbha Development Board has been stopped since the year 2011-12, vide Mah. Govt. Planning Division G. R. No., dated 04-08-2014. Though there has been positive effect of the development works taken up in Board's area the primary amenities could not yet reach everywhere. The Board requested to the Hon'ble Governor for this purpose to make available funds through Development Board. In accordance with this the Hon'ble Governor has given approval only for the year 2014-15 Rs. 100 crore each to Vidarbha, Marathwada and Rest of Maharashtra Development Boards to allot funds.

Regarding incurring expenditure from this fund, the Hon'ble Governor has given the following directives.—

The Board should spend a minimum of 50% of this fund for the programme of human development so as to increase the human development index. But for each taluka or Nagar Parishad, recommendations for expenditure

should be maximum limit of 3.0 crores. From the balance fund, 0.5% fund should be set aside for monitoring and evaluation of the work taken up during this tenure. The remaining balance of 49.5% should be distributed in the districts in proportion of its population, within Board's jurisdiction. While recommending works for the district it should be limited to the allotted definite district wise funds.

As per the allotment of 100 crore, district wise funds, although, have been decided vide Planning Department letter of 14-11-2014 considering the special fund received under the scheme for the districts within Board's area Rs.1399.95 lakh Rs. have been actually made available. In this context district wise and objective wise recommendations have been made as follows. The details of works taken up from district wise special funds are as follows :

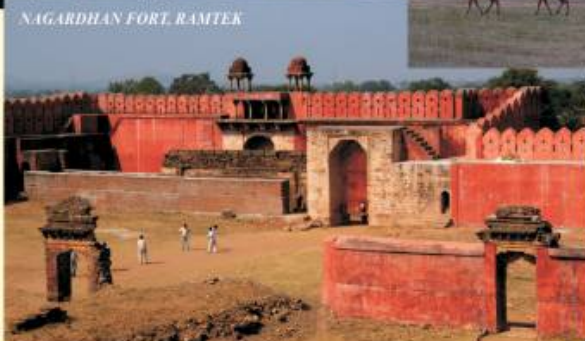

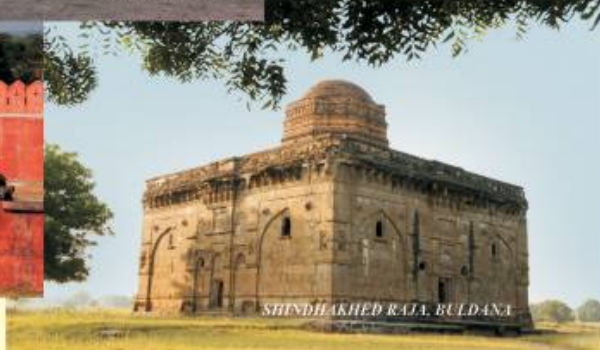
